

Grateful for Community

- Rabbi Jeff Clopper

It felt like déjà vu, but it was real.

Just last summer, mere days before leaving for the Jewish summer camp I frequent each year, I received a call. After years of struggling with Alzheimer's disease, my mother had died. Rather than heading to camp, my wife, kids, and I headed to Massachusetts for a funeral and the *shivah* that followed.



Flash forward to this summer - once again I was ready to head to camp. Once again, I received a call, only I knew this one was coming. My grandfather who had in May reached 108 years old had just died. Rather than packing the car for camp, Carol, my kids, and I gathered our things to head back to Massachusetts. Another funeral, another time to gather and share a sense of loss and grief.

Some may immediately think, "Perhaps Rabbi Jeff, you should consider retiring from camp before losing another family member." But that thought would never cross my mind.

Being in camp was healing. Among the joy of being with campers and staff and the camaraderie of fellow rabbis, cantors, educators, and Jewish professionals who, like me, dedicate weeks in the summer to be at camp, I found a lot of strength and solace. I could carry my mom's and my grandfather's spirits and use them to propel me into each new day. And every now and then, I could share a story or a memory and know they were with me in spirit.

Around that same time, I began to hear from many of the TBE temple family. Some reached out by email, others sent beautiful cards and heartfelt wishes. From the office, I learned that many had made donations to various temple funds. Even 150 miles away, I felt a gentle stream of love from so many.

In the shadow of these two heartbreaking losses, I am reminded that I am so lucky. I have two incredible communities - Crane Lake Camp and my Temple Beth El family - who so readily wrap their arms around me, giving me a sense of hope and comfort.

I am thankful to everyone who has expressed sympathy and condolences (and I am working to get out those thank-you notes). And I hope that everyone who reads these words, all who are part of Temple Beth El, will know that love and support is ready for you, too. That is what it means to be part of a community - to give of our hearts and love as we can and then to receive the same when we need it. That is one of the core values I believe we embrace as a synagogue.

When you need, please reach out. We do not always know what is happening in the lives of our community members. However, there is a lot of love and kindness and support here. And it is here for you, too.

Come hear the sound of the *shofar* in person. Visit one of the live locations (to be determined) and hear the call to the holiness of this season.

Tashlich at Gold Star Battalion Beach - 5:00 to 6:00 p.m.

Join us for a chance to "cast away" your sins AND help feed the needy in the Huntington area. With Gold Star Battalion Beach as our backdrop, we will spend some time in meditation and reflection to continue our spiritual work of the High Holy Days season. Bring a loaf of bread to "cast away" as a donation to help the hungry.

Kol Nidre: Sunday, September 24th from 8:00 to 9:30 p.m.

Kol Nidre, the haunting melody of the High Holy Days, will play three times, calling us to repentance. It is the holiest day of the year, so we begin our time of reflection.

Yom Kippur: Monday, September 25th

Yom Kippur Morning Service - 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

The Day of Atonement continues with powerful worship and song. Rabbi, Cantor and members of our Adult Choir as we seek forgiveness for any shortcomings and errors of the past year.

A Time to Heal, A Time to Remember (Yizkor) - 1:00 to 2:00 p.m.

As we wipe our personal slates clean, we take a little time to make ourselves whole again. Be a part of this healing service, with readings, songs, and meditation to help lift your spirit. We will remember and honor our loved ones with prayers and mournful melodies. Our video Book of Memory will be shared as we carry those memories in our hearts.

Time To Say I'm Sorry - 2:30 to 3:00 p.m.

For preschoolers and tots and their families. Rabbi Jeff and his good friend Bear will share songs, stories and a fun activity as we think about being the best person we can. During this sacred time, we'll remember how kindness and forgiveness are the keys to a good new year.

Family Service - 3:00 to 4:00 p.m.

For elementary school children and their families. Join Cantor Alison to sing, ask for forgiveness and share the stories that help us stay true to our Jewish values and responsibilities.

Neilah and Havdalah - 5:00 to 6:00 p.m.

Yom Kippur is coming to an end. Be there as we gather outside (weather permitting) for a message of hope and blessing in the New Year. Neilah (the concluding service) and Havdalah (the very brief ritual of separation) will help us bring these Ten Days of Awe to a conclusion. As you leave, renew your soul with our traditional challah, pound cake, juice and coffee.

Hello! I am Jack Schatten, and as part of Social Action, I run the sandwich making program here at Temple Beth El. In this issue of *The Buzz*, we wanted to share some of our sandwich story.

First, a little about me. I've been a member of TBE for almost 20 years (I did start Hebrew school when I was 7, but still). My volunteering journey started when I was preparing for my *Bar Mitzvah*. I volunteered every week here at the temple for H.I.H.I. (Huntington Interfaith Homeless Initiative), and monthly at St. Hugh's Church for Project H.O.P.E. (Helping Other People Eat). Even after fulfilling

my *Bar Mitzvah* community service hours, I continued to find ways to get involved, leaning in where I could, and continuing with the Sunday Suppers. Then COVID hit and all the programs hit pause.

That brings us to the sandwiches. In the summer of 2021, we partnered with Tri-CYA (Tri Community and Youth Agency) in Huntington. We hit the ground running, making 60 sandwiches a week that we then delivered for the children who attend Tri-CYA programs on Fridays and Saturdays. Our wonderful regular volunteers Aleta, Harlee, Lori, Myra, and Sherry are often assisted by *B'nei Mitzvah* students, doing their community service. Without this group's participation and their help shopping for, making, and delivering the sandwiches, we would not have so successfully maintained the program over the past two years. And it's getting even better! Due to some generous donations, on top of the incredible generosity of the grant administered by the family of Mina & Irving Klein, in October, we will be able to expand our sandwich program to twice weekly, including Sundays. As part of this expansion, we would love to bring on new volunteers to help with our existing Thursday time slot (4:30 to 5:10-ish), and/or the new Sunday morning time slot (exact time TBD).

We would love to have you help out, and if you have children in the Religious School, they are of course welcome to help out as well! Your generosity and interest is greatly appreciated. We look forward to having more people to help people in the Huntington community, the people that we live with and interact with every day.

I want to close with another big THANK YOU to the volunteers who have made this possible so far; a preemptive thank you to anyone who helps out in the future, and a special thank you to Sue Seiler, Carol Werblin and the dozens of others involved in Social Action who, throughout the years, have allowed me to give back and enable others to give back to our community.
